

Eightieth Division At Washington, August 18-21

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 1.—Many war-time leaders of units of the 80th Division will be in Washington, D. C. during the 10th National Reunion of the 80th from August 18th to 21st, to welcome the men of their old commands, according to the communications received by the reunion committee here during the past week.

Major General Adelbert Cronkhite, who commanded the division in

France and following the war served two terms as National Commander of the Veterans Association will be present. Major General Briant H. Wells at present assistant to the Chief of staff of the Army and former commander of the 159th Brigade of the division will also take an active part in the convention. Colonel E. G. Peyton, now commanding the 30th Division National Guard at Atlanta, Georgia, who led the 320th Infantry Regiment, Brigadier General Frank S. Cochou, Commander of the Third Infantry Brigade at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, former commander of the 319th Infantry Regiment; Col. Ashby Williams, leader of the First Battalion of the 320th Infantry; Col. Earl D. Church, Commissioner of Pensions, who served as Division

Ordinance Officer, Colonel W. W. Gordon of the office of Chief of Cavalry, and past National Commander of the organization, including Captain Carl D. Cella of New York; Lt. Frank Schoble, Jr., of Philadelphia, Captain John Morgan of Charleston, W. Va., and Judge D. Paulson Foster of Pittsburgh, will all be present for the reunion.

The convention will open on Sunday and the principal feature of the opening day will be a Divisional Memorial Service in the Amphitheatre in Arlington Cemetery. The services will be in charge of Rev. Edward A. Wallace of Manhattan Beach, N. Y., Divisional Chaplain. Wreaths will be laid on the tomb of the Unknown Soldier and on the grave of Brigadier General Lloyd M. Brett, noted leader of the 160th Infantry Brigade, 80th Division.

A strong effort is being made on the part of the 80th Division men in Johnstown to secure the 1930 convention of the 80th for their city. Delegations from Philadelphia, and from Wheeling, W. Va., will present invitations from these points at the annual business meeting on August 21st. It is possible that with a large attendance of Virginia members present, that they will be an important factor

in determining next year's convention city, although the attractions offered the veterans in the various invitations submitted will have considerable influence on the final action taken.

Own Grand Opera For Pittsburghers

Grand opera will be presented in Pittsburgh during the coming season by its own company, Frank Vittor, sculptor, announced yesterday. A chorus now is being trained and arrangements have been made with a number of famous stars to take the lead parts, it was revealed.

A Rossitto, operatic tenor, will be conductor and Miss Barbara Wellman will assist him, Vittor said. The first opera, Tigoletto, will be presented October 14. Gigli, Rose Ponselle, Amato and others have been approached to sing lead parts, it was learned.
