Sport Brief

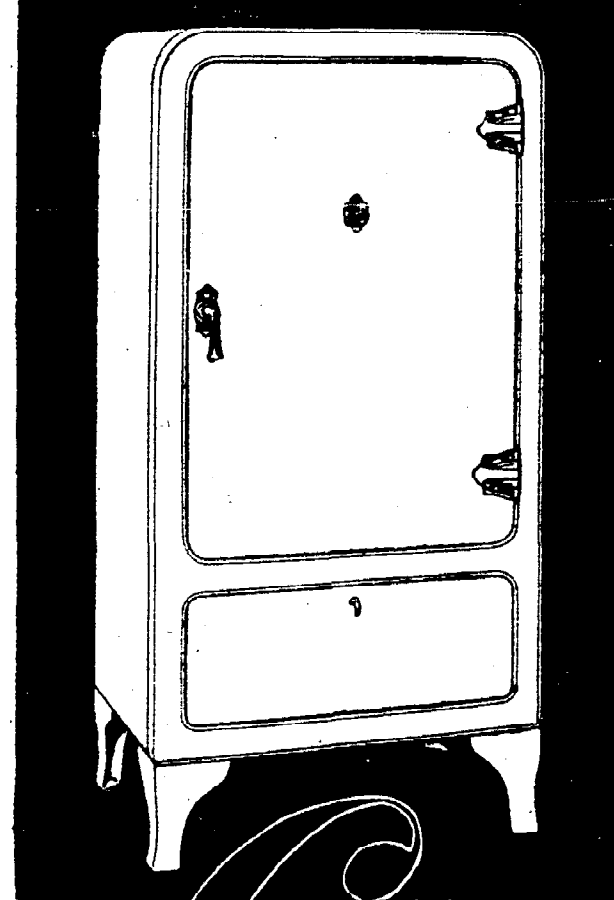
