The pine cone tree made by Stephanie Marcoline was won by Elizabeth Zugates.

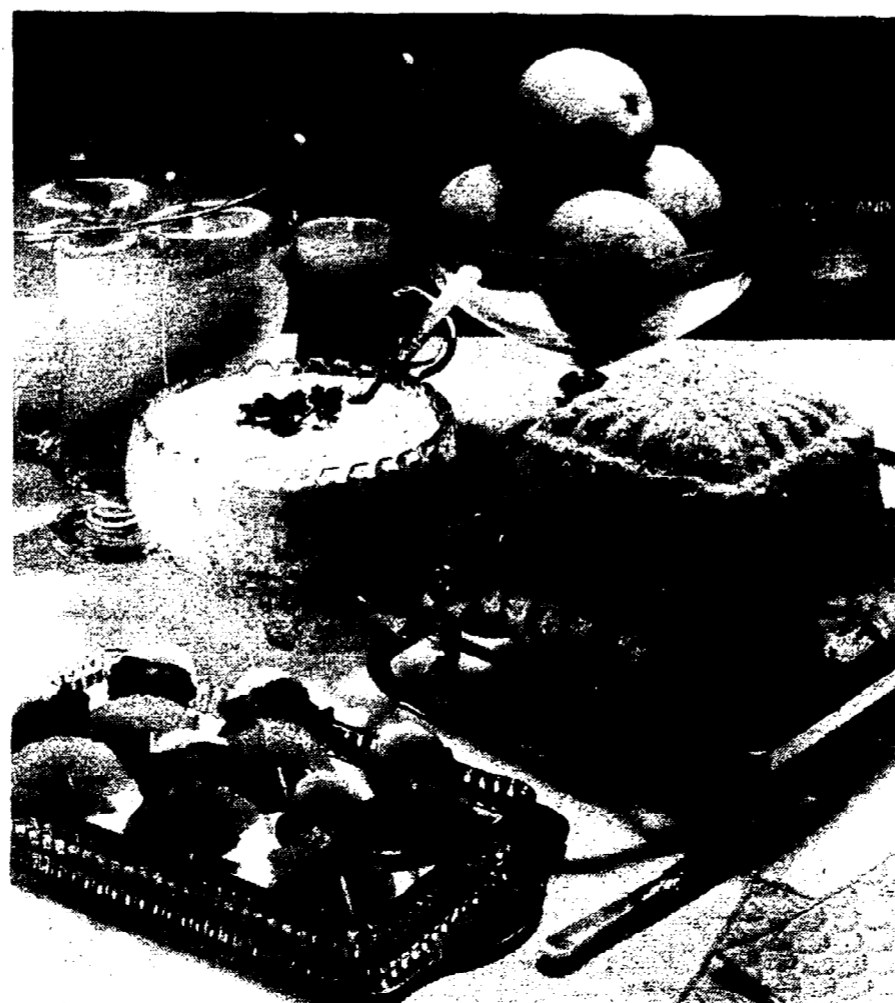
Following the meeting the Ways and Means committee held an auction with Pat Emphield and Nancy Sherry doing the auctioneering.

Citrus Appetizers With Stellar Flair Add Zest To Any Party Table

Countdown Citrus Ka-Bobs
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 pound chicken livers, cut into serving size pieces
1 pound bacon
3 or 4 large oranges
1 can (8 ounces) water chestnuts, drained
1 cup orange juice
½ cup soy sauce
1 clove garlic, crushed
½ teaspoon ground ginger

In medium skillet, melt butter; sauté chicken livers 5 to 7 minutes, until thoroughly cooked. Cut bacon slices in half crosswise; wrap bacon around chicken livers. Peel oranges and cut in small

ened at room temperature
6 tablespoons frozen concentrated orange juice, thawed, undiluted
1 can (7 ounces) tuna fish, drained and flaked
2 tablespoons finely chopped onion
1 tablespoon finely chopped parsley
¼ teaspoon dried leaf tarragon, crumbled

In medium bowl blend cream cheese and orange concentrate. Add tuna, onion, parsley and tarragon, mix well. Refrigerate several hours before serving. Spoon into bowl, garnish with chopped parsley and fresh orange sections, if desired. Yields two and one half cups.

Harvest Moon Cheese Spread, for example, is a mellow golden mold of cheddar cheese and orange juice laced with crunchy morsels of chopped walnuts. Another accompaniment for crackers or rounds of breads is Pate' Neptune. It's a blend of tuna, cream cheese and frozen orange juice concentrate.

Appetites take off on Countdown Citrus Ka-Bobs. Tender orbs of bacon-wrapped chicken livers are threaded on picks between chunks of sweet, fresh orange and crisp water chestnuts. The combination of interesting flavors and textures is commanded by a spicy orange juice baste.

A zesty glaze of mustard, grated orange rind, brown sugar and Florida orange juice makes Celestial Chicken Wings a soaringly delicious addition to a party buffet.

And after all this food, try Pluto Punch. Fruity and naturally sweet, it's made with orange, grapefruit and pineapple juices with a touch of grenadine.

Harvest Moon Cheese Spread
1 envelope unflavored gelatine
½ cup cold water
1 cup orange juice
2 cups finely shredded cheddar cheese (8 ounces)
½ cup finely chopped walnuts
¼ cup mayonnaise
½ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon liquid red pepper seasoning parsley

In medium saucepan, sprinkle gelatine over cold water. Heat, stirring constantly, until gelatine is dissolved. Remove from heat; stir in remaining ingredients. Pour into oiled three cup mold. Refrigerate four hours, or until firm. Unmold onto serving plate; garnish with parsley. Serve with assorted crackers. Yields three cups.
